

Some common snails and slugs that might be found in your garden



Slippery Moss Snail height 6-7 mm
(*Cochlicopa cf. lubrica*)



Common Chrysalis Snail h. 4 mm
(*Lauria cylindracea*) e.g. under ivy



Rounded snail width 6-7mm
(*Discus rotundatus*) Under logs etc.



Pellucid Glass Snail w. 4-5mm
(*Vitrina pellucida*) Winter, damp places



Smooth Glass snail w. 8-10mm
(*Aegopinella nitidula*)



Draparnaud's Glass Snail
(*Oxychilus draparnaudi*) w. 11-16mm
3 other similar British species



Garden (or common) Snail
(*Cornu aspersum*) w. c.35 mm



Strawberry Snail w. 11-15 mm
(*Trochulus striolatus*)



Hairy Snail w. 6-10 mm
(*Trochulus hispida*)



Copse Snail w. 17-23mm
(*Arianta arbustorum*) In damp places



Brown-lipped Snail w. 21-24mm
(*Cepaea nemoralis*) The White-lipped snail (*C. hortensis*) is usually smaller with a white lip.



Kentish snail w. 17-20mm.
(*Monacha cantiana*)
Shell creamy white with reddish flush around mouth.



Girdled Snail w. 10-12 mm
(*Hygromia cinctella*) A rapidly spreading introduced species



Large Black Slug L. 60-130 mm
(*Arion ater* agg.) Also orange, black etc



Yellow Slug L. 80-130mm
(*Limacus flavus*) Comes out at night.



Greenhouse Slug L. 55-70mm
(*Lehmannia valentiana*)
Introduced, now spreading widely



Field Slug L. 35-50mm
(*Deroceras reticulatum*) A pest species



Budapest Slug L. 50-70mm
(*Tandonia budapestensis*)
